Riffs for Solo Flute (1974)

First performance: 7 December 1974, Toronto

Riffs for solo flute reflects the characteristics of the "many moods of jazz blues" - the improvised manner within a twelve-bar melodic form, the slow, sad, melancholy feeling interrupted with highly-charged "shouts" and a dialogue of call-and-response patterns coloured by bent pitch inflections. The work is composed in twelve segments of various durations related only by the Blues style and a recurring long-tone cadence on a low G. The title Riffs is the jazz-man's slang for repeated jazz figures that are a feature of the work. Riffs was commissioned by New Music Concerts under a grant from the Ontario Arts Council. It was written in 1974 and premiered by Robert Aitken on December 7, 1974 in the Edward Johnson Building at the University of Toronto.
